This is a major step forward for BTC, our students and community. Achieving accreditation for CBE offerings required significant preparation and collaboration. The Accreditation Sub Committee led the effort to ensure our systems, policies, and educational practices met NWCCU's rigorous standards for quality and accountability.

### VET TECH

Each hour-long appointment has not only offered top-notch veterinary care to these animals, but has also given our students invaluable hands-on learning experiences in working with rescues. #### VET TECH CLUB

BTC's Vet Tech students are in their final quarter on campus and currently studying exotic animal medicine. Thanks to funding from the ASBTC, 11 members of the Vet Tech Club were able to visit Woodland Park Zoo this month. Students spent a few hours touring the zoo to see the animals and then spent time with the veterinary staff at the zoo vet clinic. Students got to see the laboratory spaces and look at exotic blood cells from an elephant and a viper and explored the area where the staff completes surgeries on zoo animals, such as lion root canals. Students were able to see many radiographs taken of the zoo animals, including a penguin lovingly nicknamed "Rock Bottom" who was full of rocks and had to have surgery to remove them. We saw the inside of the zoo ambulance where tigers and gorillas are transported, as well as the area where the zoo completes their necropsy.

### BTC CELEBRATES 25 YEARS OF ACCREDITATION

In the 1999-2000 academic year, BTC was first granted accreditation by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges, Commission on Colleges (later renamed the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities, or NWCCU). Accreditation by NWCCU means that BTC meets or exceeds NWCCU standards for institutional quality. BTC's accreditation was most recently reaffirmed by NWCCU in 2022 based on our Evaluation of Institutional Effectiveness self-study and a visit by peer reviewers. Based on our Mid-Cycle Evaluation report and October 2024 visit, we had some of our 2022 recommendations for improvement cleared. Thank you all for contributing to these reports and talking with our visitors! Maintaining an active institutional accreditation status doesn't happen without every single person on campus coming together to put in the hard work to support BTC's mission. ### LOVELY LAVENDER: DID YOU KNOW?

Lavender is indigenous to the mountainous areas of the countries bordering the western European part of the Mediterranean region. When early travelers brought it back, the plant spread fairly rapidly to other parts of the world, and by the sixteenth-century lavender was already a muchloved plant in English gardens. The first lavender plants found in America made their way here sometime after the first European settlers.

Records show lavender has been in use for over 2,500 years. The early uses of lavender were at least as numerous as today's, but they tended to be more of a medicinal nature. Biblical references to lavender are found in the gospel of Luke by the name used at that time, spikenard. Lavender was also used in ancient Egypt for mummification, and the Romans scented their public bathhouses with it. The name lavender is derived from the Latin verb lavare — to wash.



Lavender's association with washing and bathing has an interesting history.

In Medieval and Renaissance Europe, washerwomen were known as "lavenders" because they spread their laundry over lavender bushes to dry for the scent it gave. Royalty is known to have used lavender for the bath, most notably Louis XIV who loved bathing in lavender-scented water.

Lavender has long been considered an herb of love, and Cleopatra supposedly used it to seduce Julius Caesar and Mark Antony. In Tudor times, a lavender brew was taken by maidens on St. Luke's Day to discover the identity of their true loves. Lavender under the beds of newlyweds ensured passion and put in the pillows of Alpine maidens it brought hopes of romance. For centuries it's long been thought to be an aphrodisiac.

The Lavender Circle blooms from mid-June through September, peaking in July/August. When you stroll through the circle this summer stop by and enjoy the fragrance and sound of buzzing bees.

### BTC FOUNDATION

#### BTC Foundation outcomes compare favorably with peer colleges in the state and around the country

The BTC Foundation recently undertook a study which compares themselves with other peer colleges in three key metrics: funds raised, endowment assets which support student success, and scholarships distributed to students.

Here is a summary of the results:

- 1. The BTC Foundation was **first** in all of the above categories as compared to the four other technical colleges in the Washington State CTC system.
  - Renton Technical College (Renton)
  - Lake Washington Technical Institute (Kirkland)
  - Clover Park Technical College (Lakewood)
  - Bates Technical College (Tacoma)
- 2. The BTC Foundation compared very favorably with its self-identified peer colleges, ranking **first** in scholarships raised, **third** in endowment assets and **first** in scholarships awarded to students. Those institutions were:
  - Albany Technical College (GA) Foundation
  - Cochise Community College (AZ) Foundation
  - Eastern Maine Community College (ME) Foundation
  - Moraine Park Technical College (WI) Foundation
  - Texarkana College (TX) Foundation

"The results of this study reflect the positive perception BTC has within our community, which includes our graduates, programs, college trustees, and all the staff who contribute to student success at the college. ### UNIT PLANNING

BTC piloted its first unit-level planning process last year for non-instructional units and added an assessment component in 2025. This simple and flexible process allows all BTC units — such as Advising and Career Services, Computer Information Support Services, and the Library — to identify how their work connects with the College's Strategic Plan, reflect on progress in the prior year if they submitted a plan previously, and make plans for the 2025-26 academic year.

### CISS - GONE PHISHING?

Phishing attacks are common and, unfortunately, they are growing in prevalence.

Phishing is, to put it simply, a ruse or a swindle. It occurs when someone tries to trick you into disclosing to them private or sensitive data, such as student data, credit card details, passwords, or even social security numbers. They could accomplish this by pretending to be a reputable business or organization or even someone else at BTC when they send you emails, texts, phone calls, social media or through conferencing applications like Zoom.

The consequences of falling victim to phishing attacks can be severe and far-reaching, affecting both individuals and organizations. Some of the potential consequences include:

- Financial Losses
- Data Breaches
- Reputational Damage
- Legal and Regulatory Consequences

By understanding the potential consequences of phishing attacks, we can better appreciate the importance of remaining vigilant and proactive in our cybersecurity practices. #### June QOM: Why are there fiscal year-end deadlines and why are they so far from June 30?

Thank you to everyone who worked hard to meet deadlines and get their requisitions and orders submitted on time!

I know it feels like the purchasing deadlines are early, but there is a good reason for this. BTC's fiscal year end dates are not set by the college, but by the State Board of Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC) based on State of Washington dictated dates. Setting the purchasing and expense cutoff dates allows the Business Office, Mailroom, and Purchasing to finish our year-end tasks on time. These three areas already feel the pinch of getting everything done within the deadlines. We understand it feels tight for you on your end, but it is even more so for Purchasing, Mailroom, and the Business Office.

As we are still in the midst of spring quarter during that time, there are certain programs and areas of the college who receive exceptions to keep animals alive, utilize fresh ingredients in labs and Café Culinaire (most people do not want a menu made up of pantry staples and frozen ingredients), assist in commencement and end of year activities, and in order to keep the campus in good repair.

How can you plan each year for these cutoffs? Make sure you are forecasting as a part of your unit planning activities. Make a plan for what is needed and when you will be purchasing these items and make sure you are well stocked for the end of year by purchasing early. Don't wait until spring quarter.

Purchasing in ctcLink will reopen in July, tentatively scheduled for July 14, 2025. An email will be sent out confirming that everything is ready to go.
