On Friday, November 13, Governor Inslee issued the <u>Washington State travel Advisory</u> on Friday, November 13 which urges people arriving from other states or countries to self-quarantine for 14 days after arrival, and limit their interactions to their immediate household.

On Sunday, November 15, the governor issued <u>COVID-19 Guidance</u> effective through December 14, to mitigate rapidly increasing COVID infection rates.

TRIO! (FOLLOW UP ON LAST MONTH'S EVENT)

This year, BTC celebrated First-Generation Student Week virtually! Activities and information included a week's worth of themed Canvas content, three live and recorded events via Zoom, awareness communications to employees and students, social media posts, and a scholarship competition. Thank you to ASBTC for sponsoring the event and to the BTC Foundation for sponsoring three student scholarships!

After engaging in activities in the public Canvas course, participants were encouraged to fill out a survey to reflect on their own experiences as first-generation college students. Forty-five students submitted over 120 reflections throughout the week.

Our keynote speaker was Dr. Lexi Tom, a member of the Lummi Nation who graduated from Northwest Indian College in 2007 and Western Washington University in 2011. She gave an inspiring speech about her own college journey that included valuable lessons for employees and students. You can watch the recording here.

Fourteen first-generation college students applied for a \$500 scholarship offered during this event with the Foundation generously awarding three Winter quarter scholarships. Ten additional students also received prizes for their participation throughout the week.

One student said that: "I appreciated that this event points out the challenges many of us face attending college, and the realization of how hard it is for many us. I really appreciate how you make us a priority."

THE FOUNDATION

The BTC Foundation recently received a generous \$25,000 contribution from Brooks Manufacturing to support student scholarships.

Brooks Manufacturing, which manufactures cross arms and transmission framing components in Bellingham for nationwide use, has been owned and operated by the Brooks family since 1935.

The company established an endowed scholarship at BTC in 2011 that annually supports students in high-cost programs at the college, including Dental Hygiene, Diesel Technology, Automotive Technology, Automotive Collision Repair Technology, Culinary Arts and Welding & Fabricating Technology. This recent contribution will be added to the already-established endowment and will increase the positive impact the scholarships will have on the lives of the students at BTC.

"From my experience serving as a member of the BTC Foundation Board of Directors, I know that scholarships can make a tangible difference in the lives of BTC's students," Brooks Manufacturing President Shannon Terrell said. "Every time a student accepts a scholarship, the gratitude, relief and excitement they express is inspiring and humbling. They want to create a better life for themselves and their families, and Brooks is proud to provide the support to help them make that happen."

STUDENT FINANCIAL RESOURCES RAMPS UP SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS

The Workforce Funding team within Student Financial Resources will be implementing outreach efforts to expand access to the Basic Food Employment and Training (BFET) program. These efforts will encourage current BTC students who may be eligible for BFET but are not currently participating.

BFET provides employment preparation support for Basic Food (SNAP) recipients who are not participating in the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). BFET helps eligible students access education that leads to gainful employment.

Students that participate in BFET may receive the following forms of support:

- · Financial assistance with college-related expenses
- Child care subsidy
- Continued Basic Food Benefits while enrolled in school
- Assistance with books for general education and prerequisite classes

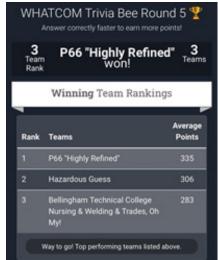

Q: What do you like to do for fun outside the office? Any hobbies?

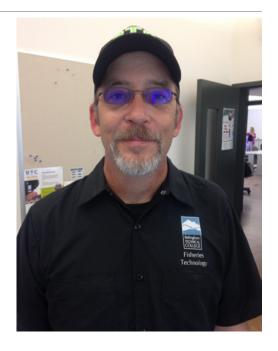
A: For fun outside the office I love to fish the local lakes for Trout and Kokanee from my fishing kayak as well as hiking.
